
A Synopsis of Community Benefit in Fiscal Year 2007.

CHRISTUS Health Southeast Texas, a region of the CHRISTUS Health system, is committed not only to offering high-quality health services to every patient we serve, but also to partnering with others in the Southeast Texas area to improve the health and quality of life for all.

The benefit that CHRISTUS Health Southeast Texas provides to the community cannot be measured in dollars alone. We are dedicated to improving community health and to collaborating with other community members to provide a comprehensive array of programs, grants and affordable services for the uninsured. The total value of our contribution to improving the health of our community exceeds the dollars that can be captured in any community benefit report.

CHRISTUS Health Southeast Texas follows the Catholic Health Association (CHA) guidelines for reporting community benefit, and we also report to the state of Texas in cooperation with state regulations.

Charity Care is defined as the unpaid cost of medical services provided to the uninsured and underinsured, including Medicaid. During fiscal year 2007, CHRISTUS Health Southeast Texas provided more than \$35.8 million in Charity Care, which is 9.4 percent of our region's net patient revenue.



Of this amount, **Unpaid Government Indigent Care** for the underserved, predominately Medicaid, comprises more than \$17.1 million of unpaid costs for fiscal year 2007, 4.5 percent of net patient revenue.

CHRISTUS Health Southeast Texas also contributed more than \$2.5 million in Community Services to the community in fiscal year 2007. Thus, CHRISTUS Health Southeast Texas provided \$38.4 million in total community benefits, which is 10.1 percent of net patient revenue earned in fiscal year 2007. This equates to more than \$105,000 a day in community benefits. Not only that, but CHRISTUS Health Southeast Texas

invests back into the community through expanded health services, new technologies and better facilities.

In addition, the cost of Unpaid
Government Sponsored Programs –
mostly Medicare – is reported to the
state of Texas following the state's
Community Benefit reporting
requirements. This year, that amount
for CHRISTUS Health Southeast Texas
was more than \$47.5 million, or 12.6
percent of the region's net patient
revenue. In accordance with CHA
guidelines, CHRISTUS Health Southeast
Texas does not include this amount in
reports of community benefit provided
to other agencies.
